



ISAAC KIMBER [Isaac 2 Richard 1]

b. Dec. 1, 1692. m. Anna Roberts, dau. of Edw. Roberts, of Nun Mills, near Northampton, England, March 28, 1717, at St. Margaret's Church, Westminster, London, England. She died April 19, 1752 and was buried in Tindall's Burial Ground, Bunhill, London. He died of an apoplectic fit Jan. 28, 1755, and was buried in the same place.

"Isaac Kimber was a Dissenting divine, born at Wantage, in Berkshire, Dec. 1, 1692, and was educated at a private grammar school in Wantage, under the Rev. Mr. Sloper, an excellent scholar, who was also tutor to Dr. Joseph Butler,* Bishop of Durham. At this school Mr. Kimber made considerable progress in Greek and Latin, after which, turning his thoughts to the ministry, he went to London to complete his knowledge of the languages under Professor Ward, of Gresham College, and also to attend the dissenting academy under Rev. John Eames. For some time after he was admitted into the ministry he had but little encouragement, and having married, he found it necessary to employ his pen for a subsistence. One of his first productions was 'The Life of Oliver Cromwell', 8vo, and soon after he was concerned with Messrs. Bailey, Hodges and Ridpath in compiling a 'History of England,' 4 vols., 8 vo., the third and fourth

volumes of which were entirely his. A few years afterwards he wrote 'The Life of Bishop Beveridge'. prefixed to the folio edition of his works, of which he was the editor. In 1724 he was called, in conjunction with Mr. Samuel Acton to the pastoral charge of Nantwich, in Cheshire, but owing to differences of opinion with his hearers, he was obliged to leave them at the latter end of 1727. On his return to London he officiated as morning preacher or assistant to Dr. John Kinch, in Old Artillery Lane, and occasionally at Pinners-Hall, for Dr. Hunt, and was also engaged as a corrector for the press for Mr. John Darby, and others. About the same time he compiled a periodical pamphlet called 'The Morning Chronicle', which existed from Jan. 1728 to May 1732, and was then dropped. In part of this period he was likewise concerned with Mr. Drew, of the Union Office, as his assistant, and supported these various labours with a quiet and even temper and a cheerful mind, though visited with a heavy affliction in his wife being deprived of her reason. During the remainder of his life he was chiefly supported by his firm friend Mr. Charles Ackers, an eminent printer in London. In 1740 he wrote an account of the reign of George II, which is added to Howells 'Medulla Hist. Angl.,' and soon afterward an abridgement of the 'History of England', in I vol. 8 vo, 1745. From 1732 to 1755 he edited the London Magazine,"

He served as volunteer ensign under General Oglethorpe in an expedition to St. Augustine, Florida 1742-5, (v. London Magazine 1744 for a partial account). He became afterwards a resident of London, engaging in writing for the various magazines so many of which appeared

about this time. From Aug. 1752 to Jan. 1755 he assisted in compiling the Gentleman's Magazine and then at his father's death edited the London Magazine, which he continued to his decease. He wrote several novels, one of which, "The Life of Joe Thompson", being the most popular. His Peerages of England, Scotland and Ireland, 3 vol. 16 mo. passed through several editions as also the Baronetage of England, 3 vol., 8 vo. by E. Kimber and R. Johnson. He was author of a History of England issued in 80 weekly numbers and bound in 10 volumes, 8 vo. He published an 8 vo. volume of his father's sermons in 1756, prefacing a memoir of his father's life and writings, and a portrait*

b. May 20, 1750, in New St. Fetter Lane, London. m. Martha, minor dau. of John Bignell, June 9, 1774 at the Parish Church of Holywell, in the suburbs of the City of Oxford. He died 1829. She died Feb. 16, 1807 and was buried in the ground behind St. Andrew's Church, Holborn, London, one step to her feet from the edge of the tombstone of Richard Haynes, Esq., of the Island of Barbadoes. Richard in a petition dated Aug., 1805, to the Stationers Company of the City of London, describes himself as a Journeyman compositor for upwards of forty years. Brooklyn, N. Y. May 27, 1871. He emigrated to S. America in 1824, when 19 years of age, resided there a few years, went back to England and then to the United States of America with his brother Henry about 1830, where they finally settled. He married first a widow with one son, and second, Mary Wetheral Thorndike, dau. of Robert Thorndike, of Camden, Maine. She was b. June 2. 1807, and d. Jan. 19, 1894, in Brooklyn, N. Y. Richard G. was a printer by trade and succeeded his brother Henry C. as foreman of the N. Y. Herald. June 1, 1820 in Paul St. Finsbury, London, and christened in July at Shoreditch Church, m. at St. John's, Hampstead, London, April 22, 1844, Sarah Ann, second surviving dau. of Richard and Mary (Farrow) Hughes of 107 Shoe Lane, London, who was b. Sept. 8, 1825, and baptized at St. Bride's, Fleet Street, London, Oct. 15, 1825. She d. Jan. 6, 1891, and was buried in Norwood

Cemetery, London, S. E., in the same grave with her infant dau. Lilian, and her mother, Mary Hughes, who d. Nov. 10, 1876 aged 85. He married secondly, Mrs. Maria Davies July 18, 1892. He d. Aug. 10, 1893, at 152 Norwood Road, London, S. E. and was buried in Norwood Cemetery.

Edward Kimber began his business career in 1836 as clerk to a bookseller, W. Smith, and remained in that situation until 1845 when he came into the business of Richard Hughes, his wife's father. R. Hughes of Shoe Lane, London, was a manufacturer of copper and steel plates for engravers, and established his business in 1820. died in 1845 and Edward Kimber carried on the business under the name of Hughes and Kimber. Under his guidance the firm has become one of the largest and perhaps most well-known manufacturers and dealers in all printers', lithographers' and engravers' machinery and supplies in the world. Edward Kimber introduced the first machine to print from lithographic stone by steam in Great Britain and America.

Edward Kimber was admitted as Doctor of Philosophy in University of Rostock, Mecklenburg Schwerin, June, 1864, and as a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, Dec. 1864. He was admitted Freeman and Liveryman of Founders' Company, London, March 4, 1867.

He was an agreeable and intelligent companion, having acquired much knowledge by very considerable reading and travelling, and

retaining it by an unusual memory. A man much respected, whose death was regretted by all.

The following is an extract from "The Christian" March 27, 1891:—

"Thomas Kimber was born in Philadelphia, in 1825. His parents were active and consistent members of the Society of Friends, and sought to bring up their large family in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Thomas was warm hearted and impulsive, generous and sensitive, and early gave promise of a useful life.

While very young he had frequent gracious visitations of the Holy Spirit; and in later years specially loved to recall one sunset hour, when, sitting on a stone by the gateway of the pleasant summer home in which the family resided at the time, a sense of the Heavenly Father's goodness and love so melted his heart that his one long desire and prayer was that he might grow up to serve Him. Those sweet and vivid impressions were weakened and partially dissipated as life with its varied interests opened before him, first at school, and then amid the besetting temptations of a successful business career; but they were never wholly lost.

At sixteen Thomas Kimber graduated at Haverford School, Pennsylvania. His intellectual abilities were much above the ordinary; a quick, comprehensive grasp of the bearings of a subject, and a marvellously retentive memory were among his mental characteristics. In 1850 and 1851, he travelled twice over the European continent, and added the results of close observation to the outcome of an extensive course of reading. Soon

after his return home he became President of the Williamsport and Elmira Railroad, and in 1861 we find him acting as Chairman of the Board of Trade of Philadelphia. He was now fairly launched upon a career of business prosperity. He was popular, influential, active in public and private philanthropic enterprises, and absorbed in formulating and working out commercial schemes. His home at Claymont on the Delaware was replete with comfort and luxury. It was the resort of men prominent in business circles, and at his annual dinners the magnates of the railroad world discussed questions involving financial interests of great importance.

With all this Mr. Kimber was not a happy man. The repeated convictions of God's Holy Spirit could not be stifled; he was ever conscious of lacking the 'one thing needful'. The death of his beloved father in 1864 affected him deeply. It was followed three years later by the visit of Henry Moorhouse. In the Lord's ordering the coming of this faithful evangelist proved a most eventful and blessed epoch in Thomas Kimber's life. Through Mr. Moorhouse's faithful appeals and earnest prayers, he was brought to realise the forgiveness of his sins through the blood of Christ Jesus, and an assurance of salvation such as he had never before known. Then followed, to use his own words, 'precious weeks of communion'. Claymont continued to be a centre of attraction, but those who visited did so to hear the glad tidings of a Saviour's love. They met together to speak, not of temporal but of spiritual interests, to talk of 'the things of the kingdom'. The drawingroom meetings and those held in neighboring churches were blessed to many souls.

The Lord led Mr. Kimber, step by step, into his destined sphere. As it was made clear that this or that habit of life was not in accordance with God's will, it was given up with cheerful alacrity. The work of grace deepened until, in 1872, brought low before the Lord by a severe illness, the seal upon his lips was finally broken, and at first in vocal prayer, afterwards in the ministry, his mouth was opened to proclaim the glad tidings of the Gospel of Christ. From this time on he consecrated himself to the services of the Lord, seeking to turn every talent to account, and valuing it only as it could be made available for the glory of God.

In 1878 he gave up the lucrative position as Railroad President, in which he might have retained a life-long interest, in order that he might devote himself more unreservedly to the work of the Lord. In the following year he removed to New York State, and later the Society of Friends acknowledged his gift in the ministry. He had a fine command of language and choice of expression, and his preaching was in demonstration of the Spirit and with power. Leaving side issues and secondary themes, his one aim was ever to preach 'Jesus Christ and Him crucified,' with such clearness and simplicity that hearers of all degrees might lay hold on the vital truth.

For twelve years, from 1874 to 1886, his life was devoted to almost continuous evangelistic service, in the course of which he visited, in the love

of the Gospel, ten of the eleven Yearly Meetings of Friends on the American Continent, some of them several times. In the prosecution of this work he travelled much, both in the heat of summer and the cold of winter, riding many a mile over rough country roads seeking out remote and isolated meetings. He lived with the people as one with them, identifying his interests with theirs, entering into all their cares and perplexities, temporal as well as spiritual. It was his joy and delight to spend and be spent in the Master's service. The only stipend he ever wished for, or received, was to be given souls for his hire.

In the deliberations of the church he was a wise counsellor. The seal of the Lord was upon his faithful labours; souls were converted and believers strengthened. Not less marked was the blessing which attended the Gospel Union work in which he engaged in the intervals spent at home. Moreover, his pen was seldom idle; and in 1887 the Degree of Doctor of Letters was conferred upon him by Haverford College. Liberal and very charitable in his feelings towards all fellow christians he was, nevertheless, intensely a Friend.

About five years ago the Lord called his faithful servant away from the field of active service into the closer fellowship of suffering. With beautiful patience he endured the pain and distress of a wasting and incurable disease. Under the fire of this sharp discipline, the grace of the Lord became more and more manifest in him. He lived in an atmosphere of prayer; in the sleepless hours of the night he would recount God's mercies, and

speak of his goodness. During this period, through the sustaining grace of Him who Himself 'bare all our sicknesses,' he was enabled to write a volume of essays entitled, 'The Early Christian Church,' which he rejoiced to see published in its second edition. Into this work he condensed the thought and research of a lifetime.

The end was a sweet and fitting one for a life like his. On the morning of Dec. 23 last, Mr. Kimber listened to the accustomed morning reading. Psalm xxiii was selected. He followed in prayer, saying:- 'I have held up thy rod and thy staff as long as I could, now they comfort me. I have cared for the little ones of thy flock to the last. Thou art with me in the valley'. Then came intercessory prayer for beloved relatives and friends. After this he knelt by the bedside, communing with his heavenly Father. Subsequently, quite exhausted, he lay down. A few quivering breaths and all was over. His eyes were closed as if asleep, and there settled upon his face an ineffable look of peace and rest, every line of pain gone. It was the look of one who was 'seeing Him who is invisible.' In life and death the Lord was with him, and his memory is a joy to many."


